

## Muchea Sheep Report 09/09/2025

## Yarding 9,935/ sheep 5,917 / lambs 4,018

Although it was a similar total to last week, lamb supplies were fewer while sheep numbers increased both in numbers and quality. Only 611 New season lambs were yarded today while quality and weight declined in old season lambs with limited numbers of trade and heavy lambs against a large proportion of secondary lambs. The buyer gallery was attended by the usual feedlot and processors along with interest from one eastern states buyer and several seasonal restockers marginally lifting values through most categories of lambs and mutton.

New season lambs gained \$10/15 with store lambs ranging from \$90 to \$170 and airfreight weights selling from \$210 to \$224/head. Trade weight lambs were selling from \$223 to \$262 and heavy lambs from \$255 to \$278/head.

Old season store lambs lifted \$8/10 ranging from \$90 to \$194 and light lambs followed suit, selling from \$162 to \$221/head. Trade lambs gained \$8/10 and sold from \$181 to \$264 while heavy lambs remained firm to sell from \$230 to \$293/head.

Merino wether hoggets with condition were selling from \$160 to \$260 while Merino ewe hoggets were making \$120 to \$196/head. Plain Crossbred hoggets ranged from \$144 to \$160 and heavier hoggets from \$188 to \$259 while younger rams sold to a top of \$280/head.

The mutton market lifted \$5/7 with boning grades making \$120 to \$165 while medium weights returned \$160 to \$230 and heavy ewes sold from \$200 to \$250/head. Heavy wethers were selling from \$150 to \$230 while mature rams gained \$10 selling from \$50 to \$187/head.
