

Muchea Cattle Report 17/11/2025

1383 liveweight and 93 veal / total 1476

Numbers fell away this week and although all categories eased in supply, it was mostly due to a lighter volume of bulls and heifers. The sale consisted of a high percentage of quality Angus and Locally bred Droughtmaster cattle represented across most categories. Presented in the yarding were good lines of trade weight steers and heifers and large drafts of cows to suit all markets along with well-bred yearlings and weaners. feeder cows were in high demand lifting 30/40c in value and live shipping was strong on bulls steers and heifers.

Local weaner steers in plain condition sold from 200c to 380c and with more cover realized 480c/kg. Light local weaner heifers were making 180c to 334c and better conditioned heifers from 380c to 410c/kg. Yearling steers over all weight ranges were selling well making 378c to 450c and yearling heifers from 328c to 400c/kg. Pastoral steer calves were light in number ranging from 120c to 324c while pastoral heifers were selling from 150c to 328c/kg.

Grown steers ranged from 338c to 408c while grown heifers returned 298c to 390c/kg. Light framed pastoral store cows sold from 60c to 236c while bigger framed store cows were in demand making 250c to 308c while medium weight and heavy weights returned 280c to 338c/kg.

Bulls suited for shipping were in demand from several exporters selling from 250c to 412c and heavy bulls gained 10c ranging from 250c to 340c/kg.
